1. Profile: Youth In Charge



YIC Training Sessions in Surrey, BC.

By all accounts CCEDNET's Youth in Charge program is off to a good start in its rural communities in B.C. Designed to engage young B.C. residents in CED, the goal of the Youth in Charge program is to create an action plan with community stakeholders that will enable young people to create economic opportunities in their local areas.

The program kicked off with its Train the Trainer session in Surrey in June. The weekend workshop, hosted by the Pacific Community Resource Centre in Surrey, prepared two youth each from four rural communities and three urban communities in CED and in facilitating their own workshops.

"The training in Surrey provided me with the skills to find and inform the youth, and hopefully some will see the importance of youth driven CED and how their participation can lead to real change," commented Harlie Myshrrall from the Haida Gwaii team. "I also feel like the four day training was enough to allow me to be capable of preparing for my own workshop and facilitating a conversation on youth driven CED."

Returning to their home communities the youth have been busy hosting workshops of their own and engaging youth in the communities to get involved in the process.

The Haida Gwaii team hosted their first workshop on July 17. The group of

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ten youth that gathered learned about CED, played the social inclusion role playing game, brainstormed and completed a S.W.O.T. to determine the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats for their community. The team was very pleased with how the first workshop went and is looking positively towards the future.

"My expectations are that we will have a few youth come on board and run with one of the ideas they've identified," commented Harlie. "The youth feel keen because they see a lot of gaps in opportunities for themselves here."

In Chetwynd, another northern B.C. community, Leah Stender and Maggie Gilbert working with the Chetwynd Social Planning Society hosted the first workshop on July 21, which included a number of local youth and other community representatives. The group also did a S.W.O.T. analysis and came up with a number of issues for youth in Chetwynd. Some possible projects that were identified were a mentoring program involving local business owners or a youth employment centre that would connect youth to employment, connect high school students to what they need to do to accomplish their goals and help unmotivated youth find out what is holding them back.

Youth all over B.C. are getting involved with CED and learning about new ways they can participate in their home communities. There are many steps still to go, but hopefully the youth can learn how to help affect their own change.

Community Economic Development Program for Professionals

Cochrane Alberta between Sept 08 and May 09

This educational program is a unique opportunity for professional development in CED. While there are CED programs already available in Alberta, this one is different in that it addresses CED from a social service/social enterprise perspective (rather than a business perspective). The program also includes a module on affordable housing. It nicely complements what is already offered in Alberta and would serve to provide a wider perspective when dealing with community issues.

In order to obtain the certificate, participants must complete eight courses between September 08 and June 09. Each course consists of two days in the classroom and two days of homework outside the classroom. Class time

for each course is scheduled on a Friday and a Saturday. The cost for each course is \$420 and includes all course materials. For those interested in pursuing the certificate program, there is a \$25 registration fee. The total cost is \$3,385. Applications for individual courses will be considered, but priority is given to those who wish to commit to completing the certificate program.

Profile of Ma Mawi's Aboriginal Y.O.U.T.H. Gathering

The Aboriginal Y.O.U.T.H. (Youth Organized United Together Healing) Gathering, held in Winnipeg's inner-city in March 2007, gave Aboriginal youth the opportunity to "turn their voices into action." With the guidance of the Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata Centre (Ma Mawi), seven youth were teamed up with experienced mentors to plan and host a conference that sought to foster a sense of Aboriginal identity, act as a forum for Aboriginal youth to express their ideas and needs, synthesize these needs into a policy plan for government and other decision makers, and enable Aboriginal youth to advocate and act for change.

This Profile is the result of the commitment to community capacity building that Ma Mawi uses, and their invitation to the Canadian CED Network to join one of their initiatives as an observer in order to tell their story for the purposes of sharing their experience, learning from practice, and inspiring others. A Letter from the Rupert Downing, Departing Executive Director of CCEDNet



When Canadians get together to work on making their communities a better place, they inevitably focus on common issues: how to make their environments safe for themselves and their children; how to create good jobs and economic futures; and how to ensure everybody has a decent home.

Over the last year, CCEDNet has played a vital role in supporting the efforts of thousands of Canadians all over the country who are taking action on these issues. In rural communities in the Northwest of BC, we helped resource Rural Roots, an action plan for rural revitalization. At our conference in St. John's, several hundred people participated – each bringing home shared strategies of '*Building Communities on a Rock Foundation.*' In Winnipeg, the CED Gathering built on the energy and vision that is driving the city's grassroots urban revitalization efforts. And in Toronto, our call for a commitment to tackle and eradicate poverty drew over 300 people to dialogue with the leader of the official opposition on their commitment to a federal poverty reduction plan.

Alongside these events, CCEDNet members and staff work on partnerships to generate resources and support for innovative initiatives – in youth engagement, in demonstrating the impact of place-based poverty reduction efforts, and in 'Growing Hope' through local sustainable agriculture and food production.

As a result, a new Communities' Agenda has been born out of thousands of hours of voluntary input from people across Canada. This policy framework provides us with a common action plan to Build Fairer and Stronger Local Economies, Tackle Poverty and Homelessness, and to Invest in Sustainable Communities.

The Communities' Agenda provides a framework for achieving the environment we need in order to fulfill our vision for Canada. Our Board of Directors is finding new ways to communicate and advance our Agenda. And we are not alone – through our international committee and networks we are connected to civil society movements on all continents with a similar agenda for building a global social or solidarity economy. As the United

Nation's Secretary-General recently articulated – *civil society is emerging as a world superpower*. CCEDNet is very much a part of that superpower's potential to create a stronger Canada – and a better world. We hope you continue to join with us in what is surely the most important work to be done in the world today.

The Canadian CED Network Welcomes a New Executive Director



Dear Members and Friends of the Network,

The Canadian Community Economic Development Network (CCEDNet) is pleased to announce the appointment of Michael Toye as Executive Director, effective July 22, 2008. Mr. Toye succeeds Rupert Downing, who will be leaving the Network to move on to other areas of interest in the CED field.

Mr. Toye joins us after being involved with CCEDNet and the broader CED movement for many years. In his six year tenure with the Network, he played a key role in administration, policy development and management which afforded him valuable insight into the strategic planning of the Network from its inception. As Program Director, he coordinated the Pan-Canadian Community Development Learning Network research project on social inclusion and community economic development. Under Mr. Toye's leadership, CCEDNet's National Conference became the premier CED learning event in Canada.

On welcoming Mr. Toye back to CCEDNet, Board of Directors' President Natasha Jackson said: "It is with great enthusiasm that we announce Mr. Toye's appointment as the new Executive Director. His proven record of excellence with our organization, coupled with his extensive experience in the broader CED movement will ensure a perfect fit. We are confident that Mr. Toye will continue to build on the legacy which resulted from Mr. Downing's leadership."

Mr. Toye's interest in the field of CED began while studying social work with Eric Shragge at McGill University. Since then, he has gained extensive experience as a CED consultant, social entrepreneur, author, lecturer, researcher and most recently, as a Policy Analyst for the Library of Parliament.

The appointment of Mr. Toye concludes more than eight (8) months of comprehensive transition planning by CCEDNet's succession planning committee which is composed of representatives from CCEDNet's Board of Directors, senior staff and partners. After an extensive national recruitment campaign, the Board of Directors unanimously approved the recommendation provided by the succession planning committee.

On accepting the appointment, Mr. Toye said: "I believe in the Network because I believe in its members. I am convinced that an approach which strengthens the ability of communities to take charge of their own social, economic and environmental destiny is an essential component of sustainable social and economic policy." Mr. Toye will be working from his

office in Québec.

Co-Op Sector Gears Up for Fall Lobby Campaign to Renew CDI

On June 17, Canadian Co-operative Association (CCA) Executive Director Carol Hunter, Government Affairs Director John Anderson, Conseil Canadien de la Coopération (CCC) President Michel Rouleau and Executive Director Brigitte Gagné met with Secretary of State Christian Paradis and presented him with a copy of the revised joint proposal for renewing and expanding the Co-operative Development Initiative (CDI) for a four year period beginning in April 2009.

CCA and CCC, together with their members, will be launching a joint fall campaign around the CDI renewal beginning in September 2008. CDI was extended for a one year period until March 31, 2009.
